TEXAS HISTORY TOP TEN: Cattle

The Bullock Texas State History Museum's website is filled with artifacts, oral histories, highlights from curators, and interesting stories. The Texas History Top Ten tool is perfect if you only have a short amount of time, want a broad overview, or want to find hidden gems about a particular topic. Use this lists to help expand your content knowledge while planning classroom lessons for your students, or send your students on assignment to explore the Top Ten lists on their own.

Cattle

The history of Texas cattle ranching is intertwined with the history of the state itself. From the earliest Spanish vaqueros to modern cowboys, ranchers have shaped the social, economic, and political identity of Texas since the 15th century.

- **Cattle drive authorization letters**
- Letters authorizing the first cattle drive from Texas to help with the American Revolution
- **Barbed wired**Five varieties of early barbed wire, "the fence that ended the open range"
- Rodeo sculpture
 Sculpture of rodeo legend Bill Pickett, the cowboy credited with inventing steer wrestling, called bulldogging
- Rodeo equipment

 Equipment of bull rider Myrtis Dightman, the first African American to compete in the National Finals Rodeo
- Cattle brand quilt
 Frances Punchard made this cattle brand quilt which includes brands from 29 Texas ranches

- Mother Hubbard saddle
 - The saddle of choice for American cowboys, a lighter version of the saddle favored by the vaqueros
- Vaqueros and Cattle Ranchers Campfire Stories
 Hover over the characters and select "Vaqueros" (explore the stories), then come back to the mosaic and select "Cattle Ranchers" to see stories from vaqueros on horseback to cowboys in pickups
- Rodeo! The Exhibition
- With this past exhibition, explore the origins of Texas rodeos and stock shows and what makes them an integral part of Texas history
- Chronology of Vaqueros and Cattle Folk
 Select the "Vaqueros" and "Cattle Folk" icons on the timeline (unselect
 "Texas History Timeline") to trace the chronology of cattle in Texas
- Oldest continuous celebration in Texas
 The annual Doans Picnic honors the pioneers who settled the area during the time of the cattle drives



Types of Resources
