

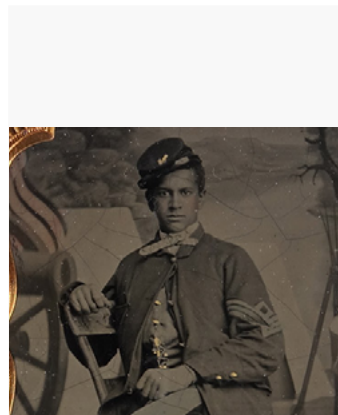
TEXAS HISTORY TOP TEN: Civil War

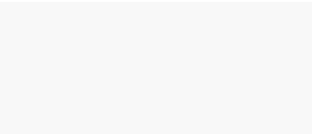
Civil War

Texas seceded from the United States in 1861 to join the Confederacy. For the next four years Texans were a part of nearly every battle of the Civil War, while those left on the home front coped with war time realities.

2. [Emancipation Day quilt](#)
A 21st century quilt celebrates Emancipation Day in Texas
3. [Five-pointed stars](#)
A collection of five-pointed stars- an emblem used by Texans going back to the Texas Revolution
4. [Sniper glasses](#)
Glasses worn by snipers during the Civil War
5. [Confederate soldier medals](#)
The only medals known to be presented to Confederate soldiers during the Civil War

6. [.44 caliber revolver](#)
Revolver manufactured by the Dance Brothers in Columbia, Texas
7. [Builder's plate from Civil War blockade ship](#)
Plate from the USS Hatteras which captured seven Confederate blockade runners
8. [\\$100 Confederate bill](#)
The \$100 bill featured Lucy Holcombe Pickens, the only woman to be featured on currency issued by a Confederate state.
9. [Civil War portraits](#)
For the first time, family members could look at a photograph of their soldier
10. [Civil War begins](#)
Select "1860-1865: Texas joined Confederacy; Civil War began"

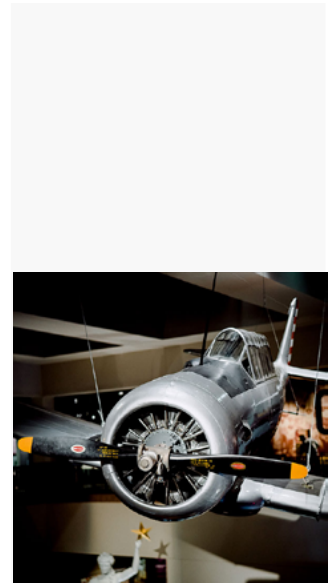
Texas Story Project
